As a writing coach with the Institute for Women's Studies, I work exclusively on students' writing. The process of writing in a Writing Intensive course stresses revision and critical thinking. Taught introductory courses in Playwriting and Fiction Writing. Chief responsibility was to give students a solid foundation upon which to continue their creative writing lives. Introduced students to the basic elements and techniques of fiction writing and playwriting. Instructed students in effective outline building. Lectured and provided writing exercises in character, plot, and setting. Lectured on creative writing theory and criticism. Lectured and provided exercises in revision. Taught students to evaluate basic fiction writing and playwriting elements and techniques in the fiction and drama of other writers as well as examine these elements in the writings of their fellow students. Second half of semester was spent in one-on-one conferences to aid students in developing their own creative voice. Playwriting students completed a portfolio comprised of a ten-minute play and a one-act play. For fiction students the portfolio consisted of two short stories. Class culminated in an open reading of students' work.
